Black Women Are Dying Young

• Black women under 30 get breast cancer at **four** times the rate

 Black women under 35 get breast cancer at twice the rate and die at three times the rate

 About 30% of all newly diagnosed Black breast cancer patients are younger than 50 years old

• Black women under 50 die at double the rate of white women

The State of Black Breast Cancer

The physiology of Black women has not been a consideration in clinical trial research.

- The clinical trials for the current standard of care drugs have had little to no inclusion of Black women.
- The average Black women participation rate for current breast cancer clinical trials is less than 3%.
- Despite sincere interest and efforts, the status quo outreach does not address the barriers to research participation and the marketing materials for recruiting



Black Breast Cancer: Our Definition

Black Breast Cancer is the constellation of exposures, experiences, and lack of science for Black women diagnosed with breast cancer that causes Black women to face disproportionately worse breast cancer outcomes.

Our Mission

TOUCH, The Black Breast Cancer Alliance was founded to educate, equip, and empower Black women to engage in robust and meaningful breast health conversations and activities that could save lives.

Our strategic imperatives:

- Disrupt the status quo by bringing both awareness and committed action to our disease
- Provide much needed education and resources to our Breastie community
- Work within the ecosystem to change the game on advancing the science
- Nurture alliances to amplify our voice and actions

In 2023, we...

- Talked to over 750,000 Black women across all of our web series— The Doctor Is In, Pink Table Talk, & Love Your Bones that air live on the BlackDoctor.org Facebook page reaching 2.7 million.
- Hit the road with more than 55 curated events across the U.S. to with meaningful interventions in the lives
 of to be where Black women where they live, work, play, pray & slay.
- Published our research manuscript Increasing Clinical Trial Participation of Black Women Diagnosed with Breast Cancer in the Journal of Racial and Ethnic Health Disparities.
- Launched TOUCH Care, the first ever advocacy led nurse navigator outreach program for pharmaceutical company clinical trials to elevate the inclusion and participation of Black women.
- Presented an abstract entitled "When We Tri(al): Reaching, Motivating, & Effectively Engaging Black Women In Breast Cancer Clinical Trial Research" during the San Antonio Breast Cancer Symposium poster session
- Were awarded the Unite for HER Community Partner of the year, the Warrior Award at the Pink Awards, the Sister to Sister Alliance Appreciation Award, and more.
- Were included in the September White House Cancer Moonshot Fact Sheet.

When We Tri(al): Reaching, Motivating, & Effectively Engaging Black Women In Breast Cancer Clinical Trial Research

BACKGROUND

According to the American Cancer Society, Black women in the United States are 41% more likely to die from breast cancer than non-Hispanic white women'. A systematic review of participation in clinical trials found that Black patients comprised less than 4% of all patients enrolled in clinical trials for emerging immune-based cancer treatments?. The physiology of Black women has not been a significant consideration in clinical trial research. Clinical trial education, recruiting, and participation are not commensurate with the burden of disease.

TOUCH, The Black Breast Cancer Alliance (TOUCHBBCA) launched the When We Tri(al) Movement (WWT) in January 2022 with robust multi-media support and nationwide community event activations to educate and empower Black women with culturally-agile messaging from the trusted voices of Black Breast Cancer survivor/thrivers. WWT provides an innovative and engaging learning platform that clearly depicts how clinical trials work, explains standard of care, dispels historical myths, establishes trust, and empowers self-advocacy.

As of October 27, 2023, whenwetrial.org has garnered over 126,000 visits and sent over 14,000 Black women to clinical trial portals. Over one-third of unique website visitors have gone into clinical trial search portals.

This quantitative analysis sought to better understand changes in knowledge, attitude, and behavior among participants following exposure to WWT. In addition, the analysis explored methods of delivery of WWT messaging and participants' opinions regarding the most convincing delivery methods.

OBJECTIVE

To assess the impact of the When We Tri(al) Movement on Black women diagnosed with breast cancer.

METHODS

Over a sixteen day period in late June and early July of 2023, TOUCHBBCA conducted research among Black women who joined the When We Tri(al) movement using a pre-experimental, retrospective pre-then-post test (RPTP) survey design to assess growth in knowledge and behavior change among Black women exposed to the Movement. This survey received 113 respondents who self-identified as Black and assigned female at birth.

SURVEY FINDINGS

32.7% of survey respondents were more likely to consider participating in a clinical trial after interacting with the WWT movement.

After interacting with the movement, 31% of respondents took active steps to participate in a clinical trial—specified as searching for clinical trials in a portal, asking about clinical trial options. talking to a doctor about clinical trials, etc. Another 17.7% of respondents reported supporting a loved one in taking steps to participate in a clinical trial only after interacting with WWT.

The majority of respondents reported first hearing about WWT through social media (59.2%), followed by "Other" (the majority of write-in responses named Google or a friend) (19.5%). Respondents reported that the most convincing WWT messages were delivered via social media (26.6%) and in-person conversations (20.4%).

CONCLUSIONS & IMPLICATIONS:

Not only is When We Tri(al) educating and equipping Black women with critical clinical trial knowledge, the movement is driving significant behavior change by Black women around clinical trial participation. Moreover, social media messaging was the most commonly reported initial exposure and was also reported to be the most convincing delivery method.

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TOUCH Care

To facilitate the clinical trial process for Black women, TOUCH is providing a Nurse Navigator Service to assist patients with securing trials, the application process, managing the informed consent process and providing coaching and counseling throughout the trial.



PATIENT NAVIGATION

A navigation program that addressed insurance, food, housing, transportation, language, health literacy, social and clinical needs increased participation in clinical research:



• TOUCH, the Black Breast Cancer Alliance, will bolster Black women's breast cancer clinical trial participation by 2025 committing to reaching 350,000 Black women and motivating 25,000 into trial portals. Additionally, TOUCH Care, the first program to provide a nurse navigator service to assist Black breast cancer patients in clinical trials by developing culturally-agile recruiting materials, training trial staff, and coaching patients, is being piloted with Genentech, a member of the Roche Group, and will add five trials annually. Less than three percent of breast cancer clinical trial participants are Black.



Black women under 35 get breast cancer at two times the rate of white women and die at three times the rate.

According to an Ad Council study, 92% of Black women agree breast health is important, 25% of women have recently discussed it, but only 17% have taken steps to understand their risk.





For the love of my gurls...

- reached over 850K people
- touched nearly 85K people
- of those who came in NOT knowing or NOT intending to take action:
 - 70% of participants educated and informed about Black Breast Health
 - 84% of participants empowered to perform monthly breast self-exams
 - 76% of participants empowered to talk to loved ones about family health history
