## Service Animals and Shelters During Emergencies

Shelters must allow service animals by <u>law</u>.

A service animal is any animal trained to do work or perform tasks for the benefit of a person with a disability (including a physical, sensory, psychiatric, intellectual, or other mental disability).<sup>1</sup>

A service animal is not considered a pet but rather an animal trained to assist people with disabilities.

Under the <u>Americans with</u>
<u>Disabilities Act</u>, service animals are limited to dogs (and sometimes miniature horses).



To determine whether the animal is a service animal, the shelter staff can only ask two questions:

- 1. Do you require the animal because of a disability?
- 2. What tasks does your animal perform for you?

## During an emergency, you may have to evacuate or leave your home to go to a safer place. Consider these tips to help your service animal stay safe as well:

- Get your service animal microchipped by their veterinarian ahead of time. Registering the microchip can help you find your animal if you become separated.
- Prepare an emergency kit for your service animal ahead of time. Include everything your service animal will need, such as food, water, medication, leashes, beds, toys, and bags to get rid of their waste.
- Place your and your service animal's important documents in a watertight container. Your service animal's important documents can include copies of their medical records, vaccination certificates, microchip information, and any prescriptions.
- Practice evacuating or leaving your home with your service animal to make sure they understand what to do if there is an emergency.
- If you're unsure how to care for your service animal in an emergency, contact your animal's veterinarian, the local emergency management office, the animal shelter, or the animal control office for additional advice and information.
